ELIZABETHAN COLLAR

Following surgery, some patients will lick or chew at the sutures, particularly when left alone. No one can predict which pets will do this. An Elizabethan collar can decrease the likelihood of a pet being able to reach the surgical incision with his/her mouth. If you wish for your pet to go home with an Elizabethan collar, please ask for the fee.

MICROCHIP IDENTIFICATION

Each year, many pets are lost due to lack of identification (collars and tags are often missing). Many are never reunited with their owners or worse, euthanized at shelters. To increase chances that your pet will be reunited with you, we recommend the placement of a microchip. This small chip (encased in glass and about the size of a grain of rice) is inserted under the skin. It is permanent and causes no reaction with the body. The chip number can then be registered with the national registry. In the event that your pet is lost and brought to an animal shelter or veterinary hospital, the chip can be scanned, and the national registry contacted to obtain information to alert the pet and owners. Since this technology became available over ten years ago, thousands of animals' lives have been saved. Insertion of the microchip at the time of surgery can be done for \$65.00

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WHY AN INTRAVENOUS CATHETER AND FLUIDS DURING SURGERY?

The use of an intravenous catheter and IV fluids is an additional means to further decrease the risks associated with general anesthesia. The catheter is placed in the vein before anesthesia is initiated. This allows the doctor and nursing staff immediate access to your pet's vein for administration of intravenous medications, which is particularly important in an emergency. Also, blood pressure tends to fall slightly during general anesthesia. IV fluids help maintain hydration and blood pressure, thus keeping the kidneys and other organs to function normally during surgery. Your pet's health and safety are our greatest concern. IV catheters and fluids are now part of standard anesthetic protocols for many veterinary hospitals and are required at our hospital. To make an intravenous catheter and fluids affordable for all of our patients, it is included in our surgery pricing listed above.

PRE - ANESTHETIC BLOOD TEST - Consent Form

Because no surgery is without some risks, however small, it is advisable to perform a blood test prior to surgery to check the blood count, protein level, kidney and liver functions, and clotting ability. We draw the blood sample at least one day prior to surgery. Should there be any indication that an abnormality exists, the doctor will contact you before proceeding or take those steps necessary to help ensure the safe return of your pet. The pre-anesthetic blood test is required for pets over three years old, but is recommended for all pets. Pets over five years of age will be required to have a more comprehensive blood test.

THORACIC RADIOGRAPHS - Consent Form

Before sedation, we strongly recommend (and require for older/at risk pets) chest radiographs. These allow us to check the heart and lungs for any abnormalities prior to anesthesia. For pets over 6 years of age, radiographs will be required to ensure your pet's safety. Pre-Op Thoracic Radiographs - \$110.00.

PAIN MEDICATION PACKAGE - Consent Form

Your pet is about to have abdominal surgery and will experience some pain associated with the surgical procure. Humans are routinely given pain medications to ease their discomfort after surgery. Because animals often do not exhibit easily recognized signs for pain, they have been generally overlooked when it comes to pain control. However, recent studies on animals and human babies have shown that post-operative pain medications will reduce the chances of post-operative complications, such as infection and poor healing, even in patients that showed no outward signs of pain.

The general anesthesia provides pain control while the patient is anesthetized, but pain sensation returns during recovery. All patients receive an injection of an analgesic to control pain for the first 4-6 hours after surgery. This medication is safe, non-addicting and as potent as those used for humans. We also strongly recommend pain medication to go home for continued relief for the first few days following surgery. The pain medication package includes pain medication to go home and a post-surgical laser treatment to promote healing from surgery.

Vaccine Requirements:

Feline: Current Feline Distemper (FVRCP) and Rabies vaccines are required. The Feline Leukemia vaccination (FELV) is an option for some cats, especially those that go outdoors. If done here, we can check our records. If done elsewhere, please provide us with a copy for our records.

FVRCP: \$16.00 Rabies: \$15.00 FELV: \$22.00

FELINE LEUKEMIA & FIV (Feline AIDS) are the leading cause of death in young cats.

If your cat has not previously been tested, it's strongly recommended that a blood test for these potentially fatal diseases be done prior to surgery. The fee is \$56.00, a 25% discount off the regular fee.
